The outside red line was DCC operated which allowed for more than one train at a time while the inside yellow line was conventionally powered to make sure those without DCC equipped locomotives had an opportunity to their trains. This arrangement has been pretty much standard for the club. When the mountain line is included, it is usually run conventionally to accommodate all the special features built into the mountain modules that utilize the conventional powering methods. Tee modules in the larger layouts provide more than two or three layout loops and ensure many trains are running at any given time, thus capturing and maintaining the attention of the attendees at the shows.
